# **Key Positive Findings**

2019 Stillwater Area School District Study

- Strong endorsement of teachers, curriculum, programming and classroom education.
  - The BOLD plan and closing schools are no longer the most serious issue facing the School District.
- Growing concern the District is not adequately funded. Perception that housing and student enrollment growth has increased and will continue to; at the same time the perception is the District does not have enough space in areas experiencing growth.

Trust in the accuracy of demographic reports.

Support for a property tax increase for all operating and bond items tested, except the construction of a new school.

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### Key Negative Findings 2019 Stillwater Area School District Study

- The overall School District atmospherics, such as quality of education and financial spending, are stagnant, if not declining.
- Continued concern and growing uncertainity about the School Board and District Administration.
- Increasing property tax hostility.
- Lack of parent enthusiasm towards the District as a whole. North/South divide on support levels for bond referendum components tested, especially construction of a new elementary school.

## **2020 Election Year**

2019 Stillwater Area School District Study

- Communication with residents about the referendum request will be difficult and cluttered:
  - A spring referendum will need to be communicated during the March Presidential Primary.
  - A fall refendum will need to be communicated during the Presidential General Election.
    - "An uninformed voter is a no voter."
  - Turnout is completely dependent on the current national political headwinds.
- The ability to recruit volunteers for a campaign will be limited due to the other campaign voluteer opportunities.
- A local election can easily become nationalized by political events outside the control of the School District.

## 2021 Election Year

2019 Stillwater Area School District Study

Communication with residents about the referendum request will be much simpler due to the lack of ballot issues.

- Residents will have more information to make the cost-benefit assessment about the referendum request.
   During the interim, the District can focus on favorably reacquainting itself with voters.
- Turnout is completely based on the referendum request. The ability to recruit volunteers for campaign will be not be limited due to the other campaign voluteer opportunities.
